
THE 45TH ANNIVERSARY ISSUE IS IN PRODUCTION!

I meditate for story ideas and ask myself: What are my favorite parts of Bamboo Ridge? I stare at the books on my shelf for inspiration. Folks You Meet in Longs Can try write, "People You Avoid at CVS" -cuz it's not da same community store ever since . . . and the aisles feel less local than they used to. Three Years on Doreen's Sofa Can try write, "Three Years on MY Sofa" -pandemic poems and how I gained twenty pounds. Pass On, No Pass Back! Can try write, "Pass On, Den Pass 'Um Back Again" -a "fictional" memoir in verse about a college semester spent majoring in cannabis. Saturday Night at the Pahala Theatre Can try write, "Monday Morning in Front of Kumu Kahua Theatre" -micro-stories about one woman's daily search for affordable parking in Downtown Honolulu. Da Word Da Preposition ... Da Verb ... Da Adjective ... Da Modified Noun. Growing Up Local Would be funny for write, "Showing Up Local" —a dark comedy about that one family reunion when your cousins roll up in head-to-toe Manuheali'i designer digs with black pearl necklace and lauhala hats, arms full of heirloom bracelets. Too easy! But Tūtū going be mad. Ewa Which Way "Hawaii Kai, How Come?" Between Sky and Sea Between working on an old idea or starting a new one. Between a blank page and a deadline —a free verse poem about procrastination. So . . . what should I write for Bamboo Ridge?
